- 6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

  - The Management Information System in the College is on par with any automatic mechanism that picks up and continues the work till it is completed.
  - The process of switching on the work rests with the exalted Management and the Principal, the Chief Administrators
  - The instructions and guidelines given to the Principal by the distinguished College Committee are brought to the august notice of the heads of Departments by the Principal with necessary cautions and precautions.

- The Heads of Departments feed the information to their colleagues in the Departments who implement what is instructed to be implemented in the best interests of students and research scholars.
- Computing systems functioning in almost all the Departments do accelerate information depending on the emergent need of circulating the fed communication.
- The Intercom connects the Principal with all the Departments of Major Subjects facilitate the passage of information effectively.
- The college office also has links to pass on information to every counter by the Superintendent as every counter in the office is fitted with an individual computing system.
- The Class Representatives are like academic bridges to carry on the information to the students.
- The circulars and notifications are mooted through the college office to every class.

  6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

#### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- The autonomy conferred on the college facilitated the means to modify the curriculum by the Boards of Studies in different disciplines.
- In the first year of its Autonomy, 2014-2015, the college decided to continue the Syllabi designed by the affiliating University namely Thiruvalluvar University for students of I UG & II UG Classes.
- The new Syllabi in Major, Allied and Languages for students of II UG and I PG 2015-2016 had been drafted as per the University pattern in sections and mark allocation in the Question Paper.
- Members of the Boards of Studies that included Representatives from the University, Alumni and other colleges extended wholehearted cooperation in the process of modification of Syllabi to expose students to updated contents of thematic significance.

#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Emphasis has been laid on computer-based learning for students to help them to understand more in the subject and on the subject convened.

- Seminars organized by different Associations had been like academic ladders for students to the possible maximum to go up higher and still higher in the major of their choice.
- Weekend Remedial Classes had been academic boons to such of those students who failed in the End Semester Examinations as the Classes fostered their study and provided ample information to get through the papers much higher than their minimum expectations.
- Five teachers had the privileged distinction of attending the Refresher course at the Academic staff college of the University of Madras to put into practice in the classroom what they had been taught and in what they had been trained for the benefit of students.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- Being an Autonomous Institution, the College had for the first time Chalked out plans for the CIA Tests I & II and executed the plans as per the programmed schedule.
- The office of the Controller of Examinations arranged for Question Paper setting by the Externals, preparation of Hall-Tickets, Paper-valuation by the Externals, Practical Examinations monitored by the Externals and for publication of End Semester Results in time.
- Teachers had the goodwill of officiating as Invigilators and the Departments had been gracious enough to distribute Hall-Tickets to students of their Major subjects.
- The principal had played an instrumental role from the date of conduction of Examinations to the date of publication of results by Hon'ble General Secretary of MMES.
- The college Autonomy had paned way for streamlining and strengthening students' zeal to prepare thoroughly for the unit Tests, oral Examinations, CIA Tests and End Semester Examinations.

# 6.3.4 Research and Development

Teachers in almost all the Departments had the distinguished honour of presenting as many as 42 Papers at various state, National and International Level Seminars and Symposia.

- As many as 60 Research Papers authored by our teachers and Research-Guides had the privileged popularity of getting in top Journals such as Journal Indian Historical Studies; International Research Journal of Management, Science & Technology etc.
- The Aquatic Animal Health Laboratory in the College had successfully accomplished an Indo-Norwegian Collaborative Research Project worth sum of Rs. 361.16 Lakhs.
- The DBT had the goodwill of sanctioning sum of Rs. 13.87 Lakhs to yet another Project undertaken by the same lab.
- The other 9 ongoing projects on Indian Medicinal Plants, Aquatic Animal Health management, white spot syndrome virus and so on were funded by different Agencies to the tune of Rs. 572 Lakhs.
- 8 Ph.D., Scholars Working under the sterling guidance of college Guide Supervisors were awarded the Ph.D., Degree by Thiruvalluvar University during the year 2014-2015.
- The Grants released by prominent funding Agencies had fuelled the momentum of the ongoing Projects in various Labs and Departments.

## 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- The beautiful garden in the college quadrangle had been given a colourful boost by planting saplings of variegated beauty to enrich the pied beauty of the campus.
- Each counter in the college office had been given a useful electronic touch by installing computers to expedite and empower all the official routine concerned.
- The College Central Library had procured more Volumes and subscribed to many more Journals to cater to the educational and research needs.
- A new computer Lab for students of B.Sc., M.Sc., Mathematics had been constituted.
- A centralized R.O. Plant had been installed to provide pure drinking water.
- The New Autonomous Block had been fitted with 20 KV Generator to provide continuous power supply.

## 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Sizeable number of students are regularly recruited by different Companies in the Interviews conducted by Various Recruiting Agencies.

- The College Placement Cell had catered most efficiently to the employment needs of qualified students of U.G. final year classes of various Courses.
- The Guest lecturers organized by the College career guidance Cell had been Manna to students as they were exposed to bask in the warmth of more employment opportunities listed out by the Exerts during their lectures.
- Top students of final year B.Com., Commerce were selected in the Interview conducted by M/S K.H. Arind Pvt. Ltd.; a wing of Internationally well reputed K.H. Shoes Company.
- Eligible students of final year B.Sc. Computer Science & Computer Applications had the favourable chance of getting recruited as computer programmers in the Interviews conducted by software Companies such as Elite Software, Def electuaries and so on.

#### 6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- Management Teachings Staff were appointed by the College Committee in the Vacancies that were not filled by the Government to strengthen the teaching learning process.
- Management Non-Teaching Staff were also appointed in the college office and laboratories for proper disposal of official and academic responsibilities in the office and in the Labs.
- The distinguished Management of the college is always ready to help the Departments and the office whenever a genuine need arises for want of qualified teachers in the Departments and qualified staff in the college office and Labs.

#### 6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

- The cordial links with some of the Major Concerns had enabled the Departments to depute their students for the In-Service Training to fulfil the norms of the University to enable them to be eligible for the Degree.
- Students of Final Year B.Com., (Corporate Secretaryship) had their in-service training at Aavin Dairy, Sathuvachari, Tamil Nadu Explosives Ltd., Katpadi, Subee Motors, Vellore and sso on.
- Their In-Service training had been a compulsory component of their curriculum designed by Thiruvalluvar University.

#### 6.3.9 Admission of Students

- Being one of the most reputed Institutions right from its year of inception in 1965, a lot of demand for seats arises. But, no rule is violated or opposed while admitting students.
- Admission's made in all the First year UG and PG Courses strictly based on the Reservation Norms of the State Government of Tamil Nadu as the College is a Govt. Aided Institution.
- During the Academic year 2014-2015, 710 students had the privilege of getting admission into I UG and I PG Aided and Un-aided Courses.
- M.Phil., Scholars had the proud academic distinction of getting admission into the course in various disciplines during 2014-2015.
- Students were provided accommodation in different PG courses put together during 2014-2015.
- As demand for more seats arose in almost all the Courses, the college had obtained due permission from the Government and the University.

  - The Alumni Association had its representation in the Boards of Studies of the College as Autonomy had been conferred in 2014.

- Some of the Alumni had been nominated as Members of different Boards of Studies to design the curriculum for UG & PG classes of the Autonomous Stream.
- Some of the Alumni had the distinction of getting nominated in the Boards of Studies as representatives from the industry as they were Industrialists in real life.
- The healthy and useful suggestion put forth by Alumni had been implemented in updating the Syllabi to match the growing needs and shifting employment scenario.

#### 6.12 Activities and support from the Parent – Teacher Association

- The Parent-Teacher Association is a well established idea-generating Unit and a running brook of academic guidance and inspiration.
- Interaction of parent with teachers had been helpful in addressing some of the genuine grievances of students pertaining to their attendance, irregularity in lab work, lost property like texts, mobiles, science records and so on during 2014-2015.
- The Association also had the distinguished credit of introducing some more palatable and hygienic eatables and others in the College Canteen related to bakery products, Cool soft drinks, hot energizing milk varieties and so on.
- The college sought the wholehearted cooperation of the parents in training and deputing students coming from their families to outshine competitors from other college in Literary Contests and in Tournaments at the District, University, Divisional and State-Levels. This paved way for the students to win scores of Medals and Cash Awards to the tune of thousands of rupees during 2014-2015.
- The Association is always a Problem-Solving Forum and one of the Cordial and Valuable ladders for the College to touch greater heights.
- Parents are bestowed with the freedom of expressing their views on the functioning of the college, its infrastructure, students' code of conduct, students' participation in academic exercises and so on. Even in 2014-2015, as in every year, the Association rendered a memorable service in the interest of students.

#### 6.13 Development programmes for support staff

- The support Staff were like propellers to the plane of administration. Their solid cooperation during 2014-2015 helped the college in obtaining its Autonomy.
- Some more Management Staff were appointed in 2014-2015 for efficient functioning of all the segments in the college office.

- As the office was fully automated, the staff who were not exposed to computeracy were imparted training in computers to be on par with the other office staff in fulfilling their official routine.
- The Govt. of Tamil Nadu Health Insurance Scheme was extended to the Non-Teaching Staff in the office and the labs as a means to cover their health by contributing a monthly premium of Rs.150 to be eligible to the tune of sum of Rs.4 Lakhs to meet the Medical Expenses of themselves and their families.
- The gardeners, the watchman, the sweepers and all other Ministerial Staff employed by the Management were extended financial assistance and Cash gifts for happy celebrations of festivals and for happy marriages of their children.
- The support staff were like the Teaching Staff given due privileges to make use of the Central Library, to compete in Sports, Games, to attend the centralized functions on the campus.
- 6.14 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly
  - NSS Volunteers, NCC Cadets and the student-members of the College Enviro Club rendered maximum service in maintaining an Enviro-Healthy and an Enviro-friendly Campus, 2014-2015.
  - Sweepers and other ministerial staff played a pivotal role in the upkeeping the college premises throughout the Academic year.
  - The R.O. Plants that provide pure drinking water to the Staff and Students had been given due and the most proper attention for their proper maintenance by mending the components that went wrong or that were found to be the breeders of ill health.

- 7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.
  - As a fitting recognition of the solid infrastructure, academic output, research advancement and excellence in sports and games and other extra-curricular activities, the UGC had conferred Fresh Autonomous Status on the college. All the I U.G. I P.G. and M.Phil., Programmes were brought under Autonomy for further progress in the academic and research regiments of the college.

- A well furnished lab equipped with computing systems and constituted with the financial assistance extended by FIST had been declared open for the benefit of students of Mathematics and also to help them to be trained in quickening the process of obtaining Mathematical results.
- The New Autonomous Block that houses the Office of the Controller of Examinations of the Autonomous Stream, the Conference Room to organize the Meetings of Boards of Studies, the Exam Hall to value the answer-scripts and the Seminar Hall to conduct Ph.D., Public Viva-Voce Examinations had been fitted with a 20KV Generator to provide uninterrupted power supply.
- The Conference Hall that prides in its elegant furniture, spacious wooden fitting silhouetted by cushioned chairs, mikes and hand mikes to facilitate the proceedings of the meetings of the Managing Committee, meetings of the Executive Committee of the Autonomous Stream, meetings of the NAAC Peer Team, meetings of the Academic Council and so on had been given a boost by streamlining and amplifying the Public Address System.
- A centralized R.O. Plant costing sum of Rs.2 Lakhs had been installed to provide pure drinking water to the Staff, Students and Visitors. The college had fixed R.O. Plants in the canteen and in the college main building and also in the hostel to cater to the water needs.
- The Web Opac facility had been provided in the college Central Library to promote the chances of students learning more and more by tapping electronic resources.
- 7.2 Provide the Action Taken Report (ATR) based on the plan of action decided upon at the beginning of the year:
  - As planned earlier to help more teachers to update their knowledge in the subjects concerned, Five teachers of different departments had been deputed to attend to the Refresher Course organized by the Academic Staff College of the University of Madras.
  - As planned to admit more no. of Students in Certificate and Diploma Courses, as many as 242 students were admitted in the certificate and Diploma Courses in Urdu and Arabic offered by the National Council for Promotion of Urdu Language, Govt. of India, New Delhi.
  - Students were trained as per the plans drawn by Language Departments, to win more Prizes in the Literary Competitions at the Inter-Collegiate and State-Levels. The efforts resulted in students winning a record of 50 Prizes including one Rolling Cup, 5 Shields, 2 Medals and several cash Awards.
  - Students were largely benefited from attending classes in spoken English, Hardware & Net Working and Tally which were conducted on Saturdays. The plans to motivate students to develop their communication and cybernetic skills had been executed most successfully.

- Intense and continuous training to the sports personalities on the campus had paved way for more athletes to bag Gold and Silver Medals and Overall Championships in the Divisional, University, State and National-Level Tournaments held in different cities and at different Universities.
- Plans to enhance the No. of New Graduates and New Post-Graduates every year and the consistent efforts resulted in 600 New Graduates and Post-Graduates obtain their Diplomas at the Graduation Day Function in 2015.
- The pages of the College Newsletter, *Hakeem Times*, increased simultaneously and in proportion with the achievements of staff and students in various spheres. This online Monthly, the Voice of the college, had expanded its size to a mini volume.
- Scores of Papers had been presented at the Seminars sponsored by UGC and other Agencies and Institutions in different parts of the country as per the plans chalked out by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell in the beginning of the academic year.
- Several Papers had been published in the Journals of National and International reputation as verbal testimonial to the worthy efforts of research on the campus.
- Efficient guidance and sweating academic labour in the labs and departments had prompted 8 Scholars receive their Ph.D., Degree in the year under review under the sterling stewardship of Guide-Supervisors on the campus.
- Plans of the college to help more students to get Community Wise Scholarships had fulfilled in generating Scholarships to the tune of Rs.26,13,699/-.
- The Aquatic Animal Health Laboratory had succeeded in obtaining a Research Project worth sum of Rs.361 lakhs which had been yet another feather of distinguished privilege on its cap of International reputation.
- The same Lab had received one more Project funded by DBT to the tune of rs.13.87 Lakhs. The lab had metamorphosed itself into a research-reservoir of global renown with sizeable number of Research Projects on hand.

#### 7.4 Contribution to environmental awareness / protection

The academic target that the college has fixed is to turn the mechanism of teaching and learning into rare recognitions that trumpet in louder volumes, the ardent commitment of the college to education research and extension activities. This will harness an everlasting trust of parents, striking goodwill of the stakeholders and towering heights of gratitude of students which, in turn, will transform into a golden measuring rod to assess the standards adopted and attained on the campus. Effective deliberations on values and universal harmony will foster a keen sense of discipline by coupling academic achievements with societal needs and career concerns. #### 3. The Context

#### 4. The Practice

As 'Academic Excellence' and 'Research' are the anchors with the support of which stands the imposing buildings of the College, more emphasis is laid on quality education propelled by qualified and more knowledgeable faculty to soar to reach and perch on the towers of Academic exuberance by winning Distinctions and Ranks in the University Examinations. This Academic Excellence is gilded with fine leaves of gold of laurels won by students in cocurricular and extra-curricular activities as the college believes the maxim, 'you can, if you can'. Students are exposed to scholarly lectures, knowledge-oriented practicals in the labs, Unit Tests and CIA Tests, literary Competitions at the District and State Levels, Sports & games at the Divisional, University, State and National Levels to win Gold and Silver medals, Shields and Trophies and Individual prizes and over all championship. The Research segment of the college is a marvellous niche priding in its multifarious minor and major Projects; over flowing financial assistance from Funding Agencies within the country and abroad; Scores of papers getting published in leading journals of National and International Standing; Collaborative ties with scientific bodies in India and in countries namely France, Vietnam, Malaysia and so on. The Labs furnished with latest and sensitive and expensive instruments and with scores of scholars pursuing research on fellowships sanctioned by the Government and the Sparkling guidance so beneficially extended by the supervisors on the campus are but the effulgent ornaments that adorn the Princess of search and research going ahead on the campus

#### 5. Evidence of Success

- As a fitting reward to the college in light of its massive infrastructure, academic output, research advancement and scores of students' welfare measures the UGC had conferred the fresh Autonomous Status on the College
- Five Assistant Professors had the privilege of attending the refresher or the Orientation course at the Academic Staff College, University of Madras.
- The Department of Urdu had been sanctioned sum of Rs. 4,62,200/- by the National Council for Promotion of Urdu Language among 96 Non-Urdu knowing students and 286 Non-Arabic knowing Students to qualify for the certificate and the Diploma in Arabic
- In literary competitions, Students had won 50 Prizes including one Rolling cup, 5 shields, 2 medals and Cash Awards.
- NCC Cadets had the privilege of representing the college in the Army Attachment camp at Secunderabad in the RDC-cum-TSC-cum-Sports camp in Chennai; in the Inter-Group Thalsainik camp at karaikudi and 44 Cadets had the distinction of qualifying in the Certificate 'B' Examination.
- One Cadet had the unique honour of attending the Republic Day camp in New Delhi.
- The NSS Volunteers had the goodwill of donating 50 units of blood to the needy patients in nearby hospitals apart from observing in all ecstasy the 'World Blood Donor's Day', the 'Sadbhavana Diwas', the 'suicide prevention Day', the 'Voters Day', the 'AIDS' Awareness Programme and several other programmes in the larger interest of the society.
- College Athletes won Gold medals in the State-Level Senior weight-lifting Tournament; in the 56kg category; in long Jump and Triple Jump in the District-Level Athletic meet and Silver medals in the State-Level Senior Weight-Lifting Tournament and in the 62kg category.

- The weight Lifting Team, the power-lifting Team and the Best Physique Team bagged the overall championship in the Thiruvalluvar University Inter-Divisional Tournament.
- 18 students were decorated with the most coveted Title, 'University Blue'.
- In Academics, 600 New Graduates and Post-Graduates received their Diplomas.
- As many as 36 Papers were presented by teachers of different departments at the State, National and International Seminars organized by different College and Universities.
- Dr. A. Sait Sahul Hameed secured the first Rank with 22 publications among the Indian Research contributors to the Aquaculture Journal.'
- His outstanding contribution had helped the State, Tamil Nadu, to secure the first position in the country.
- He had successfully accomplished an Indo-Norwegian Collaborative Research Project worth Sum of Rs.361 Lakhs and another Research Project funded by DBT to the tune of Rs.13.89 Lakhs
- As many as 822 students had received communitywise scholarships to the tune of Rs.26,13,699/- during the Academic year, 2014-15.
- Some more welfare measures were planned and executed in the larger interest of Staff and Students.

### 6. Problems encountered and Resources required

The College did not encounter may major Problem during the Academic year, 2014-15, as in almost all the Academic years. Problems, if at all any, found their own solution with the kind co-operation of the distinguished members of the managing committee. They were gracious enough in releasing the funds to meet the emergent needs in the Savannah of research till the Grants were sanctioned by the funding agencies like DBT, FIST etc. To avert the problem of disturbed power supply, the management facilitated the use of generator till the power supply was restored. Staff and Students were provided pure drinking water by activating the R.O. Plants installed in the wings of the main block and in the College canteen. And thus, the problem of supplying purified water was tackled by the management successfully. The Labs had the convenience of pumping out the waste through the alternatives made by the management. The College took steps to the Scholarships sanctioned in time for the benefit of students. The Text Book Library was able to cater most efficiently to the reading needs of Students by providing books of their choice and the central library had the avenues open for downloading material to strengthen students' knowledge of the Texts. Students grievances were readily attended by the Principal and Head of the Department concerned.

### 8. Analysis of the Feedback

- Majority of the parents were delighted with the fact that the college was conferred Autonomy which they considered to be a great recognition of the successful stories of the college in almost all the fields of activity.
- Some expressed the need for redesigning of the curriculum to make what would be learnt in the classroom suitable to what would be expected in the job avenues.
- Some of the Alumni desired for the introduction of more number of certificate courses, for example, a certificate course in communication skills or Mass communication or Hardware and Networking which would serve as an additional and the most desired qualification of students in their search for better placements.
- Most of the feedback was a means of encouragement to go ahead and to march onward to achieve more and more goals that were set with all the available infrastructure and academic expertise on the campus.
- Few Students wished that the door should be kept open for more students to enroll as NSS volunteers and NCC cadets.
