2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

- The IQAC had the distinguished exaltation of collaborating with different Committees on the campus to organize the Golden Jubilee Celebrations for four days, from 5th to 8th February, 2016, in the august presence of Top Personalities from all over the country including Dr. H. Devaraj, Vice-Chairman, University Grants Commission, New Delhi.
- With the kind co-operation extended by the college Committee and the Principal, the IQAC had succeeded in obtaining from Thiruvalluvar University to start B.Sc., Chemistry as an un-Aided Course to meet the overwhelming demand for seats in B.Sc., Chemistry.
- The IQAC had paved way for getting permission to initiate the Diploma course in Computer Application, Business Accounting and Multilingual DTP sponsored by the NCPUL, New Delhi and the National Institute of Electronic and Information Technology, Government of India, New Delhi.
- Similarly, the strenuous efforts of IQAC had resulted in commencing the certificate course in Persian Language offered by the National Council for Promotion of Urdu Language, Govt. of India, New Delhi.

Members of the IQAC had mobilized more number of student-athletes to win medals and shields in different Divisional, University, State and National-Level Tournaments.

- To recruit more number of students in Service-oriented units to strengthen the units to cater to the genuine needs of patients in the near

- The plan was executed properly as per the Norms of the Government and almost all such vacancies, numbering six, were filled with qualified Staff by the State Government of Tamil Nadu.
- This Plan had yielded such dividents as 23 teachers in the regular vacancies had the privileged chance of attending the Refresher or the Orientation course at the UGC Academic Staff Colleges of different Universities.

- 1.4 Whether there is any revision/update of regulation or syllabi, if yes, mention their salient aspects.
 - Being an Autonomous Institution, there had been revision in the syllabi with sole intention of updating textual information for students' progress in Academics.
 - In the second year of its Autonomy, the college facilitated avenues for the meeting of different Boards of Studies to restructure the syllabi for students of all I U.G. and I P.G. Courses.
 - Each Board had on its Panel members of the faculty concerned including the Head of the Department and Representatives from the Alumni and Industry in addition to a Professor nominated by the university, namely Thiruvalluvar University.
 - The components of the syllabi were given due importance in accordance with their relevance and in the light of their worth and necessity befitting the challenges posed by changing spectrum of learning, teaching and evaluation in the larger interest of career prospects of students.
 - The curriculum designed by the Departments was placed before the members of the Board for a detailed discussion and as per the suggestions made by the Board, certain components were deleted and some syllabus on par with the syllabi designed by Experts.
 - Lessons in Foundation English Urdu and Tamil were given a boost by including articles on great scientists and renowned Philanthropists such as Thomas Alva Edison and Nawab C. Abdul Hakeem Saheb to place them before students as fitting role models.
 - The Papers on English major I & Major II were given a Philip by preferring more Indian writers in English to carve a verbal hall of fame in their fond memory and reverence on the lines of English writers.
 - Major subjects in all the U.G. Courses were shown deserving consideration by incorporating components of topical significance to amplify the Textual knowledge of students in the courses concerned.
 - Similarly, Allied Papers were also streamlined by selecting such topics that would fit into the framework as more important components that would match the standard of all major papers.
 - The Electives were also duly altered to create awareness among students about the upkeep of environment and to include in them a regard for human values.

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

The College evinced keen interest in effectuating still further teaching and learning to make students everlasting beneficiaries. In addition to the existing mechanism, the college had implemented few more measures to make the process much more useful and much more effective.

- More teachers were deputed to attend the orientation or Refresher course at the Academic Staff colleges of different Universities to ventilate avenues for them to update their knowledge in the field concerned to help students to benefit from their intense training.
- Students were instructed and guided to learn more by tapping electronic resources like Internet to learn more and to equip themselves with much more authentic information to ampling their know-how in the segments concerned.
- Special tutorial classes were organized to promote the prospects of students who could not fair well in unit Tests and CIA Tests I & II. They were exposed to personal coaching and written

- Tests at periodical intervals. The tiresome efforts of teachers and students bore rich fruits in the subsequent Test and End Semester Examinations.
- The Central Library was made to keep open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. on all Working Days to help students to consult more books and reference volumes and Journals of National and International Standing to Strengthen what they knew to make it stronger and more useful.
- As usual, the Educational Aids were driven into action to tone up students' knowledge of Texts and to provide a large canvas for better and effective learning.
- More silver medals were introduced to honour the Class Toppers in the End Semester Exams to encourage more students to win the medals as a fitting reward for their strenuous efforts and matchless merit.
- Inter-class Seminars and Intra-class get togethers were increased to provide academic platforms to students to prepare papers on important lessons and sections of Text Books and present them at the Seminars in the same way of a State or a National Seminar. Students were extended all possible help and necessary guidance by teachers who were equally interested in the progress of students.

 - The IQAC obtained feedback from students to evaluate teachers' role in imparting lessons and in equipping students with the knowledge to shine in the Examinations.
 - The feedback was analyzed with cooperation extended by the principal and the Heads of Departments and necessary steps were launched with students' progress as the ultimate goal.

The prime motto of the college is 'Enter to Learn, Leave to Serve'. This itself exemplifies the Institution's social responsibility. One of the routine activities on the campus is to cater to the social needs of the people in the villages nearby and also needy patients in the hospitals.

- As blood is defined as the 'Elixir of life', student-volunteers were encouraged to donate blood to the patients who were undergoing surgery in the Internationally well reputed CMC Hospital at vellore and the Government Hospital in vellore and Apollo Hospital, Melvisharam.
- Hon'ble collector of vellore presented an Excellence Certificate to the college praising its services to the patients and its deep concern for their welfare by deputing students to donate blood.
- Students who were visually challenged were extended the expected help and cooperation by conducting classes, in which they were provided all possible assistance by arranging a healthy student to write the answers expressed by the blind during CIA Tests I & II and the university or End Semester Examinations.
- A village was adopted by the College NSS units to pitch their Annual camp to cater to the genuine needs of the natives.
- The college NSS volunteers laid roads, cleared the campuses of schools, library, mosque, temple, church and offices in the locality.
- Efforts were made and succeeded in cleaning the Water tank meant for supplying drinking water to the entire village.
- A rally of students was planned and executed on the 'Voters' Day' to create an awareness about the vote among the public. A meeting was organized in the college to inform students to know the importance of vote and all of them were

- advised to exercise their franchise on the Election Day. The meeting was attended by the officials concerned.
- On the 'World Suicide Prevention Day' yet another rally was organized to make the public aware of the purpose of life and to counsel them to live to the last minute as expected by God, All merciful.
- The 'Flag Day' had been observed on the campus in all solemnity and the funds collected on that day were sent for the welfare of the Army.
- Student-members of the college service-oriented units namely, the Rotaract, the Red Ribbon, the Youth Red Cross, the Rangers, the VIDES and the media club rendered yeoman service in the best interests of the well being of the people.

4.2 Computerization of administration and library

- The College had computerized its various wings of administration to maintain transparency and to expedite all official works and to achieve perfection.
- Adequate number of computers were procured to computerize the work in every section in the College Office.
- Process of finalizing the list of eligible students on the basis of merit and as per the Reservation norms of the Government for admission into various U.G. and P.G. courses and M.Phil. and Ph.D., Programmes was fed to the computers in the Student Admission Section. 5. Student Support and Progression

- 5.1 Contribution of IQAC in enhancing awareness about Student Support Services
 - As the College has students' progress as its vision and mission, the IQAC adopts various means to create awareness and even to enhance it among students for their well being and prosperity.
 - The IQAC put up circulars in the Central Notice Board and the Department Notice Boards to bring to the notice of students various student support systems functioning in the college.
 - Teachers were requested by IQAC to inform students about important Notices and helping wings of the College Union.
 - The IQAC succeeded in popularizing the significance and utilitarian value of NCC, NSS, Red Ribbon club, Anti Ragging Squad, Rangers, VIDES and other support systems and as a result more number of students were enrolled in all such service-oriented clubs.
 - The IQAC chalked out proper strategy to help students to be aware of various scholarships and also mobilized the Office Staff in-charge of scholarships to finalize duty filled-in Applications to place them on the online within the last stipulated date for due consideration by the Government.

- The role of IQAC in encouraging students to donate blood, through NSS and NCC, for the sake of the sick in hospitals in the district was conspicuous and even commended by the Higher-ups concerned.
- The Cell Collaborated with the Department of Physical Education on the campus and paved avenues for the College Sports Personalities to win medals and shields and Individual championships in scores of Divisional, Inter-Divisional and National Level Tournaments.
- The Student support services on the campus were highlighted by the IQAC in all possible ways and by requesting the Principal to include them in the College Calendar for the ardent notice of Students.

5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

- The College innovated several ways and means to track and assess the progress made by students, staff and the college in particular.
- The Principal called for the meetings of Head of Departments at frequent intervals in his office to know about the progress made by students in Academics, Research and Sports & Games.
- The Heads of Departments organized Departmental meetings to ascertain the progress of students in their respective course of study by assessing students' performance in various Tests and Examinations; regularity in attendance; ardent attention in the classroom; level of commitment while doing Practicals in the labs; behavior in general and response to questions in the classrooms.
- The graph of Progress was maintained systematically and students who were lagging behind were exposed to proper and effective counselling.
- The Internal Audit committee in the college played a vital role in recording the progress by visiting Departments to collect data to maintain a Ready Reckoner and to plan further to amplify the progress.
- Teachers in-charge of classes were assigned the task of encouraging the class Toppers to touch Still greater heights and the Slow learners and the failed ones to attend Remedial classes that were conducted to help them to grasp the lessons and the subject with ease and with more attention.

- 5.4 Details of student support mechanism for coaching for competitive Examinations (If any)
 - As the College is in good rapport with Alagiya Kadan IAS Academy, Chennai, the Trainees engaged by the Academy organized a written Test to select students for free coaching by the Academy in New Delhi. Two students passed Test with honours and were recommended for free coaching by the Academy.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

VISION OF THE COLLEGE

- To sensitize students' awareness to venerate quality as the defining element.
- To foster the exultant spirit of Universal harmony by making education powerful and pervasive.

GOALS

- To provide an ideal system of higher education to all, in general, and Muslims, in particular.
- To train the youth in need based Job oriented Courses.
- To inculcate in the minds of the youth a sense of discipline and creative thinking.
- To bring about a complete and harmonious development of all factors that contribute to the formation of human personality.
- 6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System
 - Yes. The Management Information System in the college is an effective means of proper administration.
 - The College Committee is the supreme body that manages and maintains the College.
 - The Secretary cum Correspondent of the College is at the helm of affairs who is endowed with rights related to appointment of teachers, sanctioning of medical leave, Granting Financial Aid to poor Students, Signing of the Bills of all kinds pertaining to Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff and Several other official routines.

- The college Management Information System is like as golden chain with so many links in between.
- The College Committee takes a resolution in its meeting and the same is passed on to the Principal through the correspondent.
- The Principal calls for a meeting of the Head of Departments and explains the decision of the committee which is implemented with retrospective effect.
- Heads of the Departments manages the affairs of the Department in consultation with his Colleagues in the Department. He designs the schedule for the unit Tests and holds meetings with the parents whose wards fail to make a mark in the unit Test, CIA Tests I & II and the End Semester Examinations or irregular for the classes.
- The College has nominated Conveners for the Committees for the Smooth functioning of the College and to attend to the genuine needs of students.
- These Committees are very many and carry out the works assigned to them most excellently and most perfectly.
- Some of such Committees include:
 - 1. Admission Committee
 - 2. Anti-Ragging Committee
 - 3. Attendance Committee
 - 4. Scholarship Committee
 - 5. Students Grievance Cell
 - 6. Examination Section
 - 7. Student Discipline Committee
 - 8. Career & Guidance Cell and so on.
- The Class Representatives who are nominated based on the marks secured in the previous End Semester Exam take care of the Classes and Pass on the information communicated by the Head of the Department to other students in the class.
- The NSS Volunteers and NCC cadets shoulder the responsibilities assigned to them for the success of the centralized functions namely The College Day, Sports Day, Graduation Day and so on.

- Each Department nominates the vice-president of its association on the basis of seniority of the Teaching Staff in the Department and the Vice-President organizes the meeting of the Association or One-Day Seminars seeking the support of the HOD and other Departmental Colleagues.
- 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- As Solid and well designed curriculum is the heart and soul of higher education, the college had evinced keen interest in framing the syllabi for various U.G. and P.G. courses and the M.Phil., Programme in different disciplines.
- The College had requested the university to appoint its Nominee as the Subject Expert to be included in the Board of studies to standardize the syllabus in the subject concerned by seeking his advice and by implementing his valuable suggestions.
- Room was created for inclusion of the Representative from leading Industry to update the syllabus that would match the demands of the career opportunities in Industry.
- One of the College Alumni who was well versed in the subject a member of the Board of Studies in the subject concerned to obtain his advice in updating the syllabus.
- The meeting of each Board of studies was designed to activate detailed discussion to improve the quality of content in the syllabus that would suit the requisites of Recruiting Agencies.
- The curriculum was se to get restructured once in two years to welcome new components that would answer the needs of the day.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- The College believes that if teaching is effective, learning will be more interesting and more beneficial. And therefore, the teaching-learning process is made more an intense mechanism than a more causal academic exercise.
- Teachers were deputed to be trained in orientation and Refresher courses to learn the latest trends in imparting instruction to make classroom work not a routine but an essential task to learn to grow academically.

- Students were provided free access to Internet to download more authentic and detailed material to enlarge the canvas of their learning and to intensify their passion to gain mastery over what they learn.
- Visual Aids were used most frequently to convert theoretical learning through lectures into visual experiences because 'Seeing is Believing'.
- Inter-class Seminars were organized to train students in preparing Papers on various topics in the syllabus to harness a healthy competition to shine more in the Examinations.
- Proper counselling was given to slow learners to fall in line with those that were well above by exposing them to additional lectures on the same lessons.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- Examination and Evaluation go together like Juno's Swans. Evaluation of answer scripts was totally done by External Examiners in spite of the autonomy conferred on the college.
- CIA Tests I and II, as preparatory Test, were made compulsory for students.

 Absentees were fined and the Parents were intimated about the absence of their wards.
- A signed declaration from the parents of students who failed to score well was obtained by HODs as a warning to students.
- Arrear Examinations were conducted on Saturdays to lessen the burden of students while taking the Regular Examination.
- Practical Examinations were conducted by inviting Externals to maintain transparency and to make students to concentrate more on the Practicals concerned.
- Students were extended the facility of applying for Revaluation of any Two Papers by relaxing the Rule that earlier permitted only one Paper.
- Likewise, Students were given the concession of getting the Photocopy of any number of Papers by filing applications within the last date stipulated by the controller's office.
- Internal marks were calculated based on the marks scored in CIA Test I & II and regularity in attendance and submission of Assignments.

- Result were published within ten days from the last day of Examination and were kept online to avoid restlessness among students about their results.
- Every written work connected with the conduct of Examinations including the finalization of Results were computerized to expedite the works and to strike the degree of perfection.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- Research is being cultivated on the campus on the lines of a kitchen garden.
- The College had emerged as the biggest Research Centre in the whole of Thiruvalluvar University.
- The College had registered maximum number of Research Scholars in almost all the Departments.
- Research Grants to the tune of 37.14 Lakhs were received from Funding Agencies like DBT.
- Research Scholars and supervisors were encouraged to publish papers of Top Standard in leading National, International Standing to uphold the image of the College.
- The Research Labs were given the privilege of procuring latest and sensitive Instruments to improve the quality and to speed up the process of innovation.
- Vast majority of Scholars pursuing the Ph.D., Programme were awarded the Degree by Thiruvalluvar University as a result of total dedication on the part of the supervisors and painstaking efforts of their scholars.
- The OIE lab functioning in the college had been showered rich encomiums as an exalted honour and in praise of its International Ranking and outstanding research innovations.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- The Central Library is a haven of Texts, Research Volumes, Reference Books etc., beautifully arranged in the sections marked for easy location.
- A Reference section was kept open exclusively for Research Scholars to consult Reference Volumes and Journals and to contribute to the research climate prevailing in the campus.

- More books were purchased in different subjects for the benefit of Staff and Students.
- A free Net Centre was activated for use by the students of U.G., P.G., M.Phil., and Ph.D., disciplines to download more useful and otherwise unavailable information and also to promote computeracy among students.
- Weekend classes in Hardware and Networking had been yet another effort of the College in its endeavor to help maximum number of students to be computerates.
- A Ramp was raised just adjacent to the second Entrance and near by the prayer Hall for the convenience of the physically underprivileged students.
- A well furnished room was kept open for saying prayers, within the main building, at the prescribed hours and to provide an easy access to many among staff and students to other prayers in case they skip main prayers for same official reason or the other.
- Classrooms were fitted with more tube lights to provide more light for writing and reading.
- New instruments were procured to meet the experimental demands in the lab befitting the restructured syllabus in science subjects for U.G. and P.G. students.
- Sensitive instruments were also purchased to augment research in the labs and also to furnish the labs with latest tools and instruments to facilitate research as per the standards maintained on the campus.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- The college had the pleasure of deputing Teaching Staff to attend the Refresher or orientation course at the Academic Staff Colleges affiliated to Universities to provide avenues of training to the staff who had not attended such training programmes earlier.
- The Management exhibited the goodwill of maintaining cordial relations with Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff for the success of all academic exercises, research assignments and sports and games.
- The college committee was more concerned about the employees' safety and evinced maximum interest in their welfare by extending all possible help and encouragement.

- Several welfare measures were taken for students' progress by creating more facilities as requested by students.
- The Human Resource Management had been given top priority on par with students' progress in studies.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- The College Committee was magnanimous enough in appointing eligible teachers as management staff in the vacancies not filled up by the State Government with the role instruction of rendering justice to students and to the classwork scheduled in the form of Time Table.
- Qualified Non-Teaching Staff were also appointed in the vacancies caused by the Staff who retired during the Academic year.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

- As In-Service Training was a compulsory component in the syllabus for students of need based courses, the college had facilitated such training by deputing students to the companies that were well known product wise, business ethics wise and in earning the goodwill of their customers.
- Students of Final year B.Com., Corporate Secretaryship attended a Training Programme in stitching shoes and apparel at the footwear design & development Institute, SIPCOT, Ranipet.
- They had the privileged chance of undergoing the Institutional Training of vellore co-operative sugar mills Ltd., Ammundi; CSC Computer Education Centre, Arcot and at K.H.Arind Private Ltd., Perumugai.
- Select students of II M.Sc., Mathematics had the good fortune of participating in the summer Training Programmme conducted by Ramanujan Institute for Advanced Study in mathematics, University of Madras, Chennai.
- Students of Physics were exposed to intense training at the workshop brought up by the Sacred Heart College, Tirupattur.
- Similarly students of I M.Sc., Zoology had their presence registered at the Seven-Day workshop conducted by sir Thiagaraja College, Madurai.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

- The fact that as many as 550 or even more number of students are receiving their Diplomas at the Graduation Day function every year, gives a hint to what kind of students are given admission in the college.
- The Admission committee, headed by the Principal, had resolved to provide free admission to students whose aggregate was more than 80 percent in the Intermediate (Plus Two) Examination. This concession drew the attention of the parents and encouraged them to admit their wards who scored more than 80% into various first year U.G. Courses.
- Students who passed the qualifying Examination in the first attempt were alone selected by Admission committee for admission.
- Admission of students was made transparent by adopting strictly the Reservation Norms of the Government.
- As the demand for admission became more and more, the college sought and obtained permission from the State Government to fill up 10 percent more seats in each discipline.

6.4 Welfare Schemes

- To harness a harmonious development of all sane factors that contribute to the formation of human personality and to achieve academic excellence through holistic approach, schemes for students' welfare were continued and few more were planned and executed for students' progress.
- Suggestions put forth by students in the garb of feedback were given due attention.
- More students were encouraged to apply for Scholarships with their eligibility as the main concern to provide financial assistance to continue their studies.
- Cameras were installed in the College portico and at the main entrance gate to check and set right the movements of students for their better.
- Such of those students who were irregular of bitten by the bug of late coming were counselled to give up such academic evils and their parents were informed by requesting them to be cautious about daily attendance and studies of their wards.

- During 2015-2016, the College had started an additional section in B.Sc., Chemistry as an Un-Aided course to meet the overwhelming demand for seats in Chemistry, one of the evergreen courses with plenty of job opportunities.
- The management is providing Interest-free loan to the staff at the time of marriage or to meet medical expenses.

- To promote students' linguistic skills not only in their vernacular but also in other languages, the College had initiated the certificate course in Persian Language Sponsored by the National Council for Promotion of Urdu Language, Government of India, New Delhi.
- To amplify students' knowledge of computers and also to popularize computeracy on the campus, the college had opened gates for the empty of the Diploma course in Computer Application, Business Accounting and Multilingual DTP in collaboration with the National Institute of Electronic and Information Technology, Government of India, New Delhi.

- In Sports & Games, the college Athletes won laurels to the college by winning Gold and Silver medals in weight lifting; overall championship in power lifting and Best Physique in the National State and Inter-University Level Tournaments.
- The College Hockey Team Secured First place in the State-Level Tournament held at VIT University, Vellore.
- The Hand Ball Team came first in the same Tournament by winning applause and everlasting admiration from the organizers.
- In high appreciation of their outstanding performance, 25 of the college super Athletes had been decorated with the most coveted Title, 'University Blue'.
- In Academics, the College made an indelible impression with 650 new Graduates and Post-Graduate receiving their Diplomas at the Graduation Day function this Academic year.
- As many as Forty Papers were presented by teachers of different Faculties at the National, International and State-Level Seminars and conferences.
- One Professor had emerged as the only Indian contributor of maximum papers to the 'Manual of Diagnostic Tests for Aquatic Animals' owned by the world organization for Animal Health, Paris, France.
- One more Professor had reached the milestone of 100 Publications in International Journals.

- Students of Mathematics, Commerce, Chemistry, Computer Science and English had won several First Prizes in Quiz competitions, Poster Presentations, Paper Presentation and so on.
- One Student of I M.Sc., Chemistry had attained 'The Bronze Standard' of the International Award for young people.
- As many as 20 Scholars had obtained their Ph.D., Degree in different disciplines during 2015-2016.

6. Problems encountered and Resources required

Functioning of the College is like the course of life that has to overcome several speed breakers on its highway. But, our college had no chance of experiencing any problem of whatsoever dimension because of the management's goodwill and generosity and personal interest in the progress of the College and in the wellbeing of Staff and Students.

- In Academics and Research, the Management's Contribution had been more and praiseworthy in catering to the educational and research needs of students and scholars for their excellence in studies and innovations.
- Basic needs such as solid infrastructure, drinking water, perennial supply of power, fresh-up rooms and such others were made readily available in the best and larger interest of staff and students.
- Financial help was also extended to the students hailing from economic wise marginalized families for completion of their courses of study.
- The College office had worked out, in all sincerity and dedication, Scholarship applications submitted by vast majority of students and mobilized official avenues on line, as per the Government guidelines, to get the financial aid sanctioned for the benefit of such students who formed majority among total number of Students in the College.

7. Notes (Optional)

The College has registered its quantum of progress on the graph of development with all its superfine academic machinery in the garb of staff, superb administrative mechanism in the garb of Principal and the Office Staff; supreme research-operational supremos the garb of supervisors and scholars; super eminent bestowers of knowledge in the garb of qualified Teaching Staff. Supra learners in the garb of students and superstars in Athletics in the garb of student-Sports personalities. The ladder of progress that helps the College to Climb rung after rung have been its Best Practices.

- The College began functioning in 1965 with just one Pre-university course.
- In these 52 years, it has grown in size and stature and in fame and name by initiating more courses to suit the shifting scenes in academic and job scenario.
- The college is now one of the biggest Institutions affiliated to Thiruvalluvar University with option to students to choose anyone of the 34 courses.
- In 1992, the college initiated courses as unaided segments of Study in the Evening College to accommodate more students.
- Apart from equipping students with sound and required knowledge to excel in the Examinations, the College has opened doors for the flight of search and research to reach destinations of everlasting popularity and National and International recognition.
- The Best Practices of the college can also be the Eye openers for the college that are on the track of development.

8. Analysis of the Feedback

The feedback submitted by the students, Parents and the Stakeholders of the college had been given top priority as it was an analysis of teachers' performance, utilitarian value of the college curriculum and the functioning of the college. The Principal and Heads of Departments in association with the Senior Faculty had prolonged discussions on the feedback and they all passed the resolution to adopt the suggestions put forth in the feedback.

- The Parents had the goodwill of appreciating the Standards maintained in the college in imparting quality education.
- Some expressed their heartfelt view that marks secured by students in unit Tests and CIA Tests I & II should be mailed to them to assess the performance of their own sons in these Tests as the aggregate of marks secured in these Tests would be added up to the marks secured in the End Semester Examinations.
- The feedback obtained from some of the Industrialists stressed the need of in-service training for students to enable them to acquire practical knowledge which will be an additional qualification in the job scenario.
- The Alumni wished that the college should initiate measures to improve the communication skills of students to help them to succeed in Job Interviews and also to gain command over English to communicate freely.
- Some of the students desired that the Arrears Exams should be conducted on Saturdays well before the commencement of Regular End Semester Examinations in November and April. They felt that their concession would lessen their burden and also help them to prepare thoroughly to score more marks.
- Some of the feedback received from students wanted to consider the plea to allow revaluation of more number of Papers by permitting them to apply for revaluation of any number of papers in which they expect some more marks.
- Students of Evening College courses required for their enrolment in NSS and NCC on par with students of the Day college.
- These suggestions were considered in the light of their genuine need and in the best and larger interest of students.
