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5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

The college has restructured the ways and means of student participation in the academic and administrative machinery of the Institution. A Committee has been instituted to address the genuine grievances of students and to respond to their academic needs. This Committee headed by a Senior Teaching Staff is taking note of all such grievances and getting them redressed to the satisfaction of students. Provision is made to nominate the Class Representatives on the marks scored by them in the previous Qualifying Exam. These Representatives are like connecting links between the class and the Department, class and the Head of the Department and class and the Principal. They are given prominent roles to play in all the Centralized Functions of the college. As they represent the whole class, complaints if any, are collected from them and the concerned Head of the Department finds proper solution to be a fitting justification to each such complaint. Every Department has its own Association and every student of the Department is a Member of the Association. These Student-Members help in the organization of Seminars of the Department. One of the students of Final Year U.G. Class is nominated as the Student Secretary of the Association, in case the Department is not offering a P.G. Programme. One student of the Second U.G. Class of the same department is nominated as the Joint-Secretary of the Association. Likewise, one student of the First U.G. Class gets selected as the Additional Secretary of the Association. In case of P.G. Departments, one student of Second Year P.G. Course gets nominated as the Student-Secretary of the Association. One student of the Final U.G. is nominated as the Joint-Secretary of the Association. Similarly, one student of the Second U.G. Class is selected as the Additional Secretary of the Association. The class representatives should communicate to students what has been communicated to them by the Principal or the Head of the Department. If any hour is made free on account of teacher's absence, the Class Representative should advance the proceeding hour with the kind permission of the Head or Heads of Departments concerned by requesting the teacher of the permitted department to kindly engage the hour. The Class Representative should attend the meeting with the Principal whenever it is called for. He should

submit the Student Attendance sheets to the concerned Professor in-charge of Student Attendance in the attendance section if any teacher desires so after taking attendance. He should keep the blackboard clean immediately after the teacher leaves the class. He should keep an eye on erring students and should take this misbehavior to the notice of the Head of the Department. While moving from one class to the other, he should lead students without disturbing other classes. The class representatives should encourage students to participate in more Co-curricular and Extra-curricular activities.

<p>The green practices are like some of the best practices of the college. The lush green campus is eco-friendly. Realizing the importance of an eco-friendly atmosphere, the college gives due importance to environmental consciousness. It is the need of the hour to create environmental awareness to the youth of the society. Hence, the college makes it mandatory to study a paper titled "Environmental Science" for the I Year U.G. students. The college encourage to generate the power through renewable energy sources and installed solar panels (25Kwh) for uninterrupted power supply. The Tar road that connects the main gate and the college buildings is made pedestrian-friendly. The college has raised structures to provide shelter to the two-wheelers and the four-wheelers that are parked. Very few ride the bicycles as many of the students have to travel in buses because of long distance. Buses that are plying in plenty are the only popular means of transport for maximum number of students as they come from families that are unsound economically. The campus is almost plastic free with proper measures initiated by the college. The polythene-free campus is enriched by flora of variegated hues and splendor. Plastic wastes on campus is reduced and the use of paper is also reduced by encouraging the uses of IT enabled communication and group SMS. College Office is a Paper-Free Office with automation of almost all segments of official mechanism. The environmental beauty is given a push by converting the campus into a green canvas and a multicoloured savannah. To maintain the carbon neutrality, there are hundreds of trees saplings planted in the campus area. Oxygen emitting trees keep the campus cool and thereby reduce the heat. Plants are watered regularly and maintained by dedicated gardeners. The college campus has adequate green cover. The trees have been documented, the genus and family name of each tree is listed on a placard. An herbal garden with common medicinal plants is maintained by the Department of Botany. To nourish to sustain hard efforts to shine as the crown of research. To transform ideas to 'Make in India', a practical reality. To contribute to the flame of research to burn bright and severe. 3. The Context The Chief goal of the Institution in the realms of search and research is that the outcome should be beneficial to the society. Scores of investigations all over the world contributed their mite to redeem the life of the people and to transform their

life-style in accordance with the shifting scenario in human society. But, except the scientists engaged in research for Agricultural promotion, many of the scientists have carried out their investigation in their own segment. The country is thickly populated with farmers who account for nearly 60 of the total population. This is why India is respectfully addressed as the 'Country of Farmers'. These bread- winners for the entire country are rocked by lack of proper investigation into the problems that affect their vocation. It reduces their quantum of produce thereby indirectly leaving a considerable percentage of the population half-stomach. In consideration with the problems faced by the farmers, those involved in prawn-culture are more affected as they are solely at the mercy of nature. Calamities such as Floods and Tsunamis wash away huge

stocks of prawns hitting the pocket and the purse of the farmers. 4. The Practice To redress the grievance of Prawn-Cultivators, the Animal Health Aquatic Laboratory functioning in the college has taken up sustenance of Prawn culture as its chief investigation in the best interest of the cultivators and the consumers. Its commitment has been strengthened by Funding Agencies namely DBT, FIST, DST, UGC and so on. What began as a mini venture has acquired the stature of a staunch investigation of National and Global standing. Prawns were exposed to a vast variety of experiments in the Lab to discover the main disease that would affect the entire population of prawns. Hard and consistent investigation had resulted in identifying the Whitespot Syndrome as the devastating agent. To arrest the growth of the Syndrome, many more experiments were activated and even accelerated which had led to the burning of lot midnight oil. But, the result was not only amazing but astounding. The perennial investigation continued for months to synthesize suitable medicine to prevent the disease in prawns. Consistent efforts coupled with knowledgeable experiments had resulted in finding out a solution to stop Whitespot Syndrome in Prawns. The medicine, in the form of a powder, was formulated for the convenience of the farmers. It was a great invention which was very much admired and appreciated in the sectors of scientific investigation and innovation. The outcome was patented for the benefit of the farmers and indirectly for societal progress. The Lab's passion to contribute its mite to the society did not stop with inventing a powerful medicine to prevent the Whitespot Syndrome among prawns. The lab went further and even farther to educate the farmers by interacting with them in villages scattered over Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu and Pondicherry. The move was not only a blessing showered

on the farmers but was also the richest boon gifted to them. The Farmers' interaction at Mungamur in Andhra Pradesh had been a landmark in the annals of investigation. It was well attended by prominent Project Investigators of India and the United Kingdom. Apart from staging Interactions with shrimp farmers, the college lab had also staged a workshop to help them be aware of the shrimp diseases and their prevention. The Aquatic Animal Health Lab had also the distinguished privilege of hosting Four One-Week National Workshops on Cell Culture Techniques for the sake of students and young scientists. And thus, the

Lab's committed devotion to make investigation a society-beneficiary is Himalayan in stature and towering pines in its grandeur. 5. Evidence of Success The painstaking efforts of the Researchers on the campus are yielding a harvest of Awards and Recognitions. Some of the young Researchers have been honoured with Fellowship. One Associate Professor in Zoology has dwelled deep into the realms of Biological Science to emerge as an OI Expert. His inimitable ingenuity coupled with perspiring efforts have crowned him with luring Awards and Titles such as 'Fellow of National Academy of Agricultural Science', 'M.S.Swaminathan Best Indian Scientist Award' and so on. A farmer of Nellore in Andhra Pradesh had the goodwill and gratitude of sending a Cheque to the tune of Rs.1,56,000/- in high appreciation of the outcome of the Animal Health Aquatic Lab which saved his prawns from falling victims to the Whitespot Syndrome. His letter of appreciation had been a verbal reward for the hard efforts of the lab in fulfilling its objective of catering to the scientific needs of the society and in doubling the income of the farmers which is one of the Visions of the Govt. of India. The success of research investigations on the campus has drawn more Researchers to pursue the Ph.D., Programme that outnumber the Researchers elsewhere in the whole of Thiruvalluvar University.

The crowning success has invited the ardent attention of scores of young scientists from all over the county to attend a One-Week National Workshop on Molecular Diagnostic Techniques. 6. Problems encountered and Resources Required Any investigation is like an adventure. It is an academic adventure to arrive at the destination by overcoming the hurdles on the way. Similar are the investigations on the campus undertaken by the Departments of Zoology and Chemistry and by other Departments related to Humanities. Such hurdles are tackled by exposing intellectual efficiency and by sharpening steadfast faith. In the initial stages, the labs encountered the problem of necessary equipment to augment research. But, the magnanimous College Committee had been gracious enough to allot funds to procure instruments and to furnish the labs with necessary infrastructure. As the research labs started gaining popularity and in the effulgent light of their outstanding commitment, funds began pouring in from prominent Agencies within the country and abroad. The flame of research was made to burn bright and even severe by the goodwill exhibited by the Scientists and Researchers within the country and countries namely, Vietnam, France, Norway, Australia and so on. It all resulted in shaping the campus as the biggest Research Hub in the whole of the University. 7. Notes:- Research, as one of the Best Practices on the campus, has won the expected recognition because of the sweating limbs and sharpened brains in the labs. This recognition has not been obtained overnight or by any miracle. 'Investigation to innovate' is the branded slogan of the Researchers toiling hard in their relevant field of investigation.
