15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The curriculum is designed to offer a comprehensive, interdisciplinary approach aimed at fostering the development of key human abilities, including cognitive, affective, and psychomotor skills. These domains span the arts, humanities, languages, sciences, and social sciences, helping students acquire the necessary competencies for success in the 21st century. The Part IV skill-based modules in the program focus on equipping students with advanced skills essential in today's world. Over 15 non-major papers across various disciplines provide students with the flexibility to choose courses that align with their individual learning needs. To ensure students gain a well-rounded understanding of computer applications, computer-based papers have been incorporated into the curricula of B.Sc. (Maths), B.Com., B.B.A., B.Com. (CS.), and other programs. A new subject, "Internship," has been introduced to the curriculum, offering students practical experience that bridges theoretical knowledge with real-world application, enhancing their professional development. Co-curricular activities such as MOOCs, Value-Added Courses, Library Usage, and other extracurricular programs like NSS, NCC, Sports, and YRC are considered Extension Activities within Component V of the program. The curriculum now includes important themes related to Fundamental Rights, Environmental Protection, Professional Ethics, and Values to promote moral awareness and ethical integrity among students.

16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The College is registered with NAD-ABC and encourages students to participate in SWAYAM courses. The credits earned from SWAYAM/NPTEL courses will be included in students' academic records through the upcoming regulations outlined by the UGC's Academic Bank of Credits. The College implements the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) and an Elective System to address local, regional, national, and global needs, promoting social awareness, enhancing competencies, and improving employability in alignment with the institution's vision. The CBCS offers students the flexibility to select courses from a range of prescribed options, including allied/elective and non-major

courses. Currently, students are encouraged to take courses on platforms such as SWAYAM/NPTEL, Coursera, TCS iON, and others. The credits earned through these MOOCs platforms are considered part of the Extension Activities under Component V of the program.

17.Skill development:

The curriculum is designed to provide students with a comprehensive and well-rounded education. It is regularly updated, with new courses focusing on employability, skill development, and entrepreneurship being introduced. Skill-based courses are integrated directly into the curriculum. The skill-based courses offered in Part IV of the program aim to equip students with advanced skills that are essential for the challenges of the twenty-first century. The inclusion of computer-based courses in programs like B.Sc. (Maths), B.Com., B.B.A., and B.Com. (CS.) further enhances the curriculum by providing students with essential computer knowledge. To align students' academic learning with real-world experience, a new "Internship" course was introduced to meet vocational needs and facilitate practical learning. Following the guidelines of Thiruvalluvar University and TANSCHÉ, Professional English and Communicative English were introduced in the 2018 regulation to improve students' communication skills.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Incorporating the Indian Knowledge System (IKS) into the curriculum is essential for preserving cultural heritage and enriching the educational experience. Here are some effective strategies for its integration, focusing on Indian languages, culture, and online learning:

- Dedicated IKS Courses:** Develop specialized courses that focus on Indian art, literature, history, and philosophy, exploring their relevance in today's world.
- Integration of Arts and Crafts:** Include modules that cover traditional Indian arts, crafts, music, and dance, emphasizing their historical importance and modern-day practices.
- Interactive Platforms:** Use tools such as forums, webinars, and virtual workshops to facilitate discussions on IKS topics among students and faculty.
- Field Projects:** Encourage History students to undertake projects that engage with local communities, focusing on traditional practices, crafts, or environmental knowledge.
- Internships with Local Experts:** Facilitate internships for students with practitioners of traditional Indian knowledge in areas such as agriculture, health, or the arts.
- Faculty Development:** Encourage faculty participation in Faculty Development Programs organized by UGC-HRDCs.
- IKS Training for Faculty:** Provide training for faculty on IKS, effective teaching methods, and the use of

technology in delivering IKS-related content. Cultural Sensitivity: Promote cultural awareness and sensitivity among faculty to foster an inclusive and respectful learning environment.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Following the UGC's directive, the college introduced Outcome Based Education (OBE) in 2018 and 2019. OBE is an essential element of the curriculum restructuring, defining its objectives, processes, and outcomes. This OBE framework acts as a foundation for the future, helping students achieve their goals and contributing to societal progress. Effective implementation of OBE requires careful planning, which is why the IQAC regularly organizes seminars and workshops to help faculty understand the complexities of OBE. The IQAC addresses key issues during these programs, which are communicated to all teachers, including: Are the written outcomes specific, measurable, and achievable? Are the teaching methods adopted aligned with the defined outcomes? Are the assessment tools designed in alignment with the expected outcomes?

1.1.1 - Curricula developed and implemented have relevance to the local, national, regional and global developmental needs which are reflected in Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) of the various Programmes offered by the Institution.

The curriculum was developed based on the guidelines provided by Thiruvalluvar University, the Tamil Nadu State Council for Higher Education, and the UGC. It follows the Elective System and Choice Based Credit System (CBCS). The curriculum emphasizes developing competencies and employability skills, fosters social awareness, and aligns with the needs of local, regional, national, and global development. It is periodically revised with valuable input from

industry experts, faculty, alumni, and students. The design and development of the curriculum are overseen by the Board of Studies and the Planning and Evaluation Committee, with final approval from the Academic Council. In 2018, Outcome-Based Education (OBE) was introduced. Additionally, the curriculum is further strengthened by skill-based courses such as internships, professional English, communicative English, and self-study options through online platforms like MOOCs, SWAYAM, and NPTEL.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses students' learning levels and organises special programmes for both slow and advanced learners.

- The student's performance in continuous internal assessments (CIA) and their overall +2 grade are used as indicators to evaluate their understanding of the material.
- The class mentor, in collaboration with the department head, assesses the students' comprehension based on their CIA performance, categorizing them into slower and faster learners. Slower learners are paired with suitable mentors to help them improve.
- Remedial lessons are designed to revisit or reinforce topics to provide slower learners with the necessary attention and support.
- Advanced learners are encouraged to participate in seminars and lead group discussions, while slower learners are assigned assignments to aid their progress.
- Instructors motivate advanced learners by providing journals and reference materials to satisfy their curiosity and offering access to additional lectures on key topics through platforms like NPTEL, SWAYAM, Coursera, and TCS iON.
- Advanced learners are encouraged to engage in seminars, conferences, workshops, and are guided to excel in competitive campus interviews for exams such as NET, SLET, GATE, TNPSC, etc.

- The college has integrated student-centered teaching and learning strategies into the curriculum of every program.
- Student-centered approaches, supported by Outcome-Based Education (OBE), help achieve course outcomes (COs), program-specific outcomes (PSOs), and program outcomes (POs).
- Academic routines incorporate problem-solving techniques in areas such as accounting, thermodynamics, and mathematics to develop program outcomes related to issue resolution.
- Each year, a significant number of faculty members are assigned to attend refresher or orientation courses through platforms like ARPIT, SWAYAM, UGC-HRDCs, etc., to enhance their understanding of student-centered methods, thereby improving teaching and learning in the classroom.

- Through an LMS, teachers can share lectures, notes, videos, assignments, and student work, fostering seamless communication and learning.
- The college library, equipped with ICT facilities, provides faculty and students with access to a range of electronic resources, including e-journals, e-PG Pathshala, eBooks, and NPTEL/SWAYAM.
- The college's IQAC initiated the use of the Coursera Digital Platform (<https://www.coursera.org/programs/c-abdul-hakeem-college-hrh5z>) to ensure uninterrupted learning for students.
- The college uses digital platforms for Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA), allowing teachers to assess students' learning levels and evaluate their academic progress.
- During the pandemic, teachers utilized mobile apps for various activities, including:
 - Classroom management via LMS platforms like Google Classroom,
 - Communication through Email, WhatsApp, Telegram, etc.,
 - Discussion forums using Google Meet, Zoom, etc.,

- Academic bodies like the Examination Committee, Board of Studies, and Academic Council regularly recommend modifications to examination procedures.
- External paper setters are responsible for preparing the question papers for the end-of-semester exams.
- A database of question paper setters is maintained for easy identification and retrieval.
- The exam papers are evaluated once, and the results are released promptly after the central valuation process is completed.
- Students have the option to request a revaluation and obtain photocopies of their answer scripts.
- After approval from the Passing Boards for each subject, the Controller's Office publishes the results on the college website.

- The Controller of Examinations' office is equipped with an automated system developed by iGraphix, which is regularly updated to ensure accurate and error-free operations.
- Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) is a key component of the examination system.
- Both CIA and End-Semester Exam (ESE) question papers incorporate Program Outcomes (POs), Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs), with appropriate assessment tools, in line with outcome-based education.
- To close the loop, ongoing improvements in curriculum design, teaching, and assessment are made based on the analysis of student performance in the ESE.

2.6 - Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 - Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on the website and communicated to teachers and students

Following UGC guidelines, the College adopted Outcome-Based Education (OBE) starting in the 2018-2019 academic year. The Planning and Assessment Committee, in collaboration with the IQAC, initiated the process of revising the curriculum to align with OBE principles. A dedicated group was formed by the committee to develop Program Outcomes (POs) for both the science and arts disciplines, ensuring alignment with Graduate Attributes (GAs) and the College Vision. Graduate Attributes, which encompass essential knowledge, skills, and attitudes, are considered critical for every graduate in the 21st century. The POs were completed and shared with all faculty members through orientation programs, workshops, Faculty Development Programs (FDPs), and other events organized by the IQAC. The Board of Studies then discussed and finalized the discipline-specific Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and course-specific Course Outcomes (COs) for each course in relation to the POs. The Research Hub on campus was established to provide services to anyone in need, ensuring that the institution's research policy is strictly followed and not exploited for unauthorized research projects.

The Research Advisory Committee promotes a culture of research through an interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary approach, encouraging both undergraduate and graduate students and staff to engage in research activities. The Committee is also responsible for maintaining ethical standards and integrity.

The AAHL focuses on research related to diseases affecting economically important aquatic animals. It has established strong collaborations with national and international research organizations, aquaculture industries, farmers, and hatchery operators. The AAHL is recognized as a National Repository for Fish Cell Lines and Viral Pathogens, funded by the Department of Biotechnology (DBT), Government of India. Additionally, it is the only OIE reference laboratory in India.

Innovative Ecosystem

The Aquatic Animal Health Laboratory (AAHL) conducts research on diseases impacting commercially valuable aquatic species. It maintains strong collaborations with farmers, hatchery operators,

aquaculture businesses, and both national and international research organizations. Funded by the Department of Biotechnology (DBT), Government of India, the AAHL is recognized as the National Repository for Fish Cell Lines and Viral Pathogens. It is also the only OIE reference laboratory in India.

Technologies Developed and Transferred for Entrepreneurship

The Agharkar Research Institute, in collaboration with AAHL, has developed a lateral flow immunoassay to detect WSSV in infected shrimp. This tool helps in monitoring shrimp health in ponds after stocking to prevent WSSV infection. The technology has been transferred to Pathgene Healthcare Pvt. Ltd. in Tirupati, A.P., for commercialization.

Incubation Centre for Fish Cell Lines

The AAHL offers facilities, fish cell lines from various species, and training to use these cell lines for various purposes, including drug screening, toxicological studies, and the development of vaccines and diagnostic tools for fish viral infections. AAHL maintains one of the largest repositories of fish cell lines and viral pathogens in India and provides training to researchers across the country.

There are 400 student volunteers enrolled across 4 NSS Units, with 100 volunteers in each unit. A highlight of NSS activities is the Annual Special NSS Camp.

The College's NCC Unit, with 160 cadets, is recognized as the Best Unit in the 10th Tamil Nadu Battalion NCC. Every year, top-performing cadets are selected to participate in the Republic Day Parade at Rajpath in New Delhi.

The Red Ribbon service unit focuses on assisting the elderly and the ill in local hospitals. It also organizes blood donation drives to support patients in need at various facilities, including the Primary Health Center in Melvisharam, the Govt. Hospital in Vellore, CMC Vellore, and other hospitals.

- The Auditorium, Seminar Hall, Mini Seminar Hall, and Conference Hall are furnished with computers, LCD projectors, and audio systems to facilitate meetings, seminars, workshops, and conferences.

- The college provides dedicated rooms for NCC, NSS, sports, and the gym, as well as a multimedia room, 50 LCD projectors, a digital library, two smart boards, and four LCD TVs for lectures and video conferences.
- The institution is equipped with advanced research instruments such as High-Performance Liquid Chromatography (HPLC), UV/Visible Spectrophotometer, Fourier Transform Infrared Spectroscopy, Electrochemical Workstation, Spin Coating Machine, Particle Size Analyzer, Deep Freezers (-20°C and -80°C), Electrophoresis unit, ELISA Reader and Washer, Fluorescence Microscope, Fluorescence Inverted Microscope, PCR Work Station, Real Time PCR, Ultracentrifuge, UV Transilluminator, incinerator, digital calorimeters, and more.
- The Computer Laboratory, with 279 computers and necessary facilities, is available for students in Computer Science, Commerce, B.B.A., and B.C.A.
- The college offers 200 Mbps leased line internet access, LCD TVs for displaying academic activities, and reliable power supply through 4 generators (85 KWh) and a 25 KWh solar panel.

The institution regularly updates the campus's IT infrastructure, including Wi-Fi, software maintenance, and installation. To enhance the efficiency of administrative, academic, accounting, and examination processes, the college has been using iGraphix software since 2012. All administrative and academic procedures are fully automated and conducted online, with IT integration in areas such as administration, finance, planning and development, student admission, and examinations. Each office assistant has access to a computer and an open cabin to ensure process accuracy, and the college office is fully automated to streamline official tasks. Students can access important information such as exam hall seat numbers, library book details, OPAS, and results through their ERP login credentials.

The college has high-speed internet connectivity, which is regularly upgraded as needed, with a current leased line of 200 Mbps. In 2017, there were only 10 ICT-enabled classrooms, but this number has now increased to 46. Additionally, a lecture capture system has been installed to support the development of e-content.

One of the institution's key goals is to promote research aimed at improving human society and rural communities. To support this, the institution provides resources and platforms for national research and development. With funding from DST FIST, the college's Resource Hub has expanded its research initiatives. The DST-FIST Program has awarded the college a grant of Rs. 66 lakhs for the second time to enhance its research facilities.

The primary objective of DST-FIST is to build essential infrastructure to support the college's research and development activities. The improvements made through DST-FIST include: • Upgrading laboratory infrastructure • Conducting hands-on training for research aspirants • Increasing the number of papers published in reputed journals • Encouraging colleges to apply for the DST-FIST program • Promoting higher education among students.

As a result of DST-FIST's implementation, the quality of research has significantly improved, leading to more paper publications, Ph.D. scholars, and research projects. The college was also recognized under the BEST PRACTICES category by DST-FIST for preparing a case study out of 610 projects across the Southern Region.

The institution's primary goal is to foster a research culture among rural students, aiming to convert learning outcomes into meaningful contributions for societal progress.

The Research Advisory Committee promotes a culture of research through an interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary approach, encouraging both undergraduate and graduate students and staff to engage in research activities. The AAHL focuses on research related to diseases affecting economically important aquatic animals. It has established strong collaborations with national and international research organizations, aquaculture industries, farmers, and hatchery operators. 3.3 - Innovation Ecosystem

3.3.1 - Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and creation and transfer of knowledge supported by dedicated centres for research, entrepreneurship, community orientation, incubation, etc.

Innovative Ecosystem

The Aquatic Animal Health Laboratory (AAHL) conducts research on diseases impacting commercially valuable aquatic species. It maintains strong collaborations with farmers, hatchery operators, aquaculture businesses, and both national and international research organizations. Funded by the Department of Biotechnology (DBT), Government of India, the AAHL is recognized as the National Repository for Fish Cell Lines and Viral Pathogens. It is also the only OIE reference laboratory in India.

Technologies Developed and Transferred for Entrepreneurship

The Agharkar Research Institute, in collaboration with AAHL, has developed a lateral flow immunoassay to detect WSSV in infected shrimp. This tool helps in monitoring shrimp health in ponds after stocking to prevent WSSV infection. The technology has been transferred to Pathgene Healthcare Pvt. Ltd. in Tirupati, A.P., for commercialization.

Incubation Centre for Fish Cell Lines

The AAHL offers facilities, fish cell lines from various species, and training to use these cell lines for various purposes, including drug screening, toxicological studies, and the development of vaccines and diagnostic tools for fish viral infections. AAHL maintains one of the largest repositories of fish cell lines and viral pathogens in India and provides training to researchers across the country.

It also organizes blood donation drives to support patients in need at various facilities, including the Primary Health Center in Melvisharam, the Govt. Hospital in Vellore, CMC Vellore, and other hospitals.

Analyzer, Deep Freezers (-20°C and -80°C), Electrophoresis unit, ELISA Reader and Washer, Fluorescence Microscope, Fluorescence Inverted Microscope, PCR Work Station, Real Time PCR, Ultracentrifuge, UV Transilluminator, incinerator, digital calorimeters, and more.

- The Computer Laboratory, with 279 computers and necessary facilities, is available for students in Computer Science, Commerce, B.B.A., and B.C.A.
- The college offers 200 Mbps leased line internet access, LCD TVs for displaying academic activities, and reliable power supply through 4 generators (85 KWh) and a 25 KWh solar panel.

4.3 - IT Infrastructure

The institution regularly updates the campus's IT infrastructure, including Wi-Fi, software maintenance, and installation. To enhance the efficiency of administrative, academic, accounting, and examination processes, the college has been using iGraphix software since 2012. All administrative and academic procedures are fully automated and conducted online, with IT integration in areas such as administration, finance, planning and development, student admission, and examinations. Each office assistant has access to a computer and an open cabin to ensure process accuracy, and the college office is fully automated to streamline official tasks. Students can access important information such as exam hall seat numbers, library book details, OPAS, and results through their ERP login credentials.

The college has high-speed internet connectivity, which is regularly upgraded as needed, with a current leased line of 200 Mbps. In 2017, there were only 10 ICT-enabled classrooms, but this number has now increased to 46. Additionally, a lecture capture system has been installed to support the development of e-content.

The college adopted Curriculum Frameworks focused on Learning Outcomes and expanded the curriculum by introducing new courses to enhance employability and entrepreneurial skills. Around 15 non-major courses are available across various fields. The student internship program aims to improve the technical skills of final-year UG students. The IQAC facilitates stakeholder feedback on the curriculum, which serves as a valuable tool for academic evaluation and strategic planning.

Enhanced institute-industry linkage

A significant innovation by the IQAC is the Institute-Industry linkage, which addresses industry needs and equips students with employable skills. This includes research and development, co-curricular activities, industry-based internships, and curriculum updates.
